Presentation of the 2020 Jesse Jones Leadership Award

Since 2019 the Tarrant County College District Foundation, operating under a charge from Chancellor Giovaninni to make fundraising efforts that "eliminate barriers that stand in the way of student success" a priority, has cultivated donors and raised over \$250,000 to create the first TCC emergency fund – the Eliminating Barriers Fund.

A large cross-functional team of TCC employees collaborated as the Eliminating Barriers to Student Success Team to create and operationalize the Eliminating Barriers Fund. Eliminating Barriers, implemented in fall 2019, is TCC's first emergency grant program and tackles the critical challenge that poverty creates to student success and completion. Access to basic needs, including adequate funding to handle emergencies, directly impacts student success and a student's ability to stay enrolled, learn, and make progress toward achieving their educational goals.

Research has demonstrated that enrollment, retention and completion are positively impacted when institutions are able to help students mitigate an emergency financial challenge. Quite often, having the money to pay an unexpected \$200 car repair bill or a \$300 emergency room visit can make the difference between staying enrolled or walking away from their education. The emergency fund allows TCC to help students address those emergencies and stay on their path to achieving their educational goals.

In the spring 2020 semester, and with the onset of COVID-19 related emergencies, the fund saw an over 600% spike in applications. Having this fund available in such an economically unstable time has meant the college has been able to retain many students who might have left otherwise.

The Eliminating Barriers to Student Success Team constantly reviews and improves the program to ensure students' needs are being met and college processes further streamlined and optimized to continue this important endeavor. The Eliminating Barriers Team has helped TCC ensure students' pool of resources increases. Most importantly, the Team has shown the student community TCC is willing to invest in them by putting our money where our heart is--- on our students!



Ruby Stevens-Morgan is the Director of Strategic Planning and Funding at the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board. Prior to this position, she served as Director of Institutional Research and Effectiveness at Prairie View A&M University (PVAMU) where she was also an adjunct instructor in the Psychology Department. Dr. Stevens-Morgan has worked in education for more than 25 years in various capacities and levels. She was a high school business teacher in Lexington, Kentucky and a statewide consultant in Frankfort for the Kentucky Department of Education (KDE). At the KDE, she managed the Technical Education Database System (TEDS) for Career and Technical Education where she was responsible for technical support, training, and reporting to local, state, and federal agencies. She earned a B.S. degree in Business Education from Auburn University, a M.S. in Curriculum & Instruction and a Ph.D. in Educational Psychology from the University of Kentucky. She is also the founder and executive director of Achievers by Choice, a 501c3 nonprofit community organization to enhance the social and academic skills of disadvantaged youth.



Soccer is the most popular game in the world, 165,000 North Texas Soccer Association players live in the TVCC service area, and many of these players are Hispanic. 301 Texas high school men's soccer teams and 207 women's teams exist; however, only15 community college men's soccer teams and 17 women's soccer teams appear within the Texas regions of the National Junior College Athletic Association. This makes soccer in Texas a prime sport for community colleges to offer to future students. Learn how development of a soccer program can strengthen Hispanic community contacts and offer prospective students the opportunity to attend college and receive a quality education with financial support.

#9—Crowdfunding: Innovative Ways to Develop Funding Sources Zoom Access:

The Eastfield College baseball team launched their first Crowdfunding Campaign a few years ago to help the team fund travel expenses, equipment, uniforms and practice gear. Among the first successful peer-to-peer fundraising campaigns in Dallas County Community College District, they utilized a creative video featuring the baseball team making a case for their needs and raised over \$11,000. Over a year ago, all seven of the Dallas County Community Colleges used this same crowdfunding process and launched campaigns that raised money to stock the food pantries at each campus. This amazing resource is available to any faculty, staff, or student organization within the district for college approved projects to harness the power of social media to fundraise for initiatives that support the mission and values of the institution. The Dallas County Community College Foundation has made the application to utilize this platform for approved projects very simple.

#10—Online OER Innovation, Accessibility, Equity, and Engagement Zoom Access:

The COVID-19 pandemic has caused instructors to review and redesign their courses. Learn how to create unique and engaging content that draws students in and helps them learn material in multiple ways. If done well, the instructor cuts costs for students while controlling content and delivering it in a variety of ways. Through podcasts, videos, screen sharing of my lecture notes, quizzes and discussion boards, this presenter is rolling out a completely redesigned macroeconomics course. What have I learned? Students like and appreciate all the "bells and whistles." I have received so much positive feedback from my students regarding the new technology that I added to my classes- mainly podcasts and videos. I have learned that this increases student engagement and instructor presence. And, I have learned that I enjoy the creative process—I am learning along side my students. This session introduces the free tools that I have used and continue to use and offers viewers the opportunity to use my ideas and creations to enrich their own classrooms.

#11— Towards NCTC Explores: How Short-Term Study Abroad Programs Support Equitable Opportunity Zoom Access:

Many community college students, especially first-generation students and students from underrepresented groups, have not had the opportunity to travel or study abroad. Through development of short-term study abroad programs, students will have the opportunity to earn course credit while gaining real-world workforce skills through exposure to business professionals and environments they would not otherwise have the opportunity to experience. Through short-term study abroad, students grow professionally, intellectually, emotionally, and academically in a completely new environment.
